The Visby Model of Political Engagement

- Identifying obstacles to foreigners' voter participation

Information

• Inform about voting rights for EU Citizens from registration/ for Non-EU citizens after 3 years.

Trust

 Distrust of the political establishment and the political system might be elevated among foreigners.

Identity

• Feeling like an active, welcome part of society will increase likelihood of voting to affect the outcome to your neighborhood.

Choice

• Finding parties and politicians fighting for issues relevant and important to a foreign national.

Ability to choose

 Education, tools and assistance to develop critical thinking and to make informed decisions in a democratic election.

Good examples:

- •Community informers of mixed backgrounds, ages etc. making home visits.
- •Distributing booklets on local rights and voting rights in different languages.
- •Text message reminders before the election day.

Good examples:

- •Meeting politicians who visit people where they spend their days: workplaces, clubs, associations.
- •Examples of local politicians and what they have accomplished for their community.

Good examples:

- •Invite the local population to bimonthly meetings with the municipality.
- •Web-based panels to include local people's input on local politics.
- •Municipal youth council for local issues.

Good examples:

- •Courses for the elected politicians on how to encourage approaching foreign citizens, and talk to them about the issues that matter to them.
- •Debate between local politicians at high schools
- •Include political discussions as a part of language courses for foreigners.

Good examples:

- •Education courses about voting procedures with pictures.
- •Visiting high schools and have language courses for immigrants to discuss democracy and choice.

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
